London and Paris

An experience of a lifetime is how students in the College described the opportunity to study abroad first in London and then in Paris. Made possible by a donation from one of the College's partners, students like Ariel Simmons (Marketing major) was thrilled for the opportunity. Among the most recent accomplishments of student entrepreneurs in the College, Ariel said, "I was so pleased to be among the undergraduate entrepreneurs who were afforded access to a unique learning experience outside of the country. Friend or Foe?

The latter is among the most selective high schools in Virginia comprised of students from Richmond, Chesterfield, Petersburg, etc. Together, the twelve built an AI solution(s) for a regional bank, i.e. Primis in concert with the Bank's Chief Information Officer Cody Sheflett. The objective of the STEM challenge was to "help a bank optimize pricing strategies for various financial products and services.....applying machine learning and data analysis to maximize profitability while maintaining competitiveness."
